

FACT SHEET Home Care Services April 2022



Services Home Care Organizations and Home Care Aides May Provide

Home Care Organizations (HCOs) arrange for home care services, which are non-medical services, by a registered Home Care Aide (HCA) to a client who needs assistance with activities of daily living. To provide and arrange for these services, HCOs are required to be licensed by the California Department of Social Services.

<u>Health and Safety Code Section 1796.12(n)</u> defines home care services as non-medical services and assistance provided by a registered Home Care Aide to a client who, because of advanced age or physical or mental disability, cannot perform these activities. Home care services include, but are not limited to:

bathing

dressing

transportation

- exercising
- positioning

shopping

- making telephone calls
- transferring/ ambulating
- housekeeping/ laundry

companionship

feeding

 toileting and incontinence care

meal planning and preparation

personal hygiene and grooming

HCAs may provide non-medical home care services and assist clients with activities of daily living. These services can include, but are not limited to:

- Helping a client bathe, dress, or use the restroom.
- Assisting the clients with exercising, transferring, ambulating, and/or positioning.
- Housekeeping duties and laundry.

- Driving the client to appointments or to run errands.
- Preparing meals and assisting the client with eating.
- Keeping a client company and assisting with telephone calls.

Services Home Care Organizations and Home Care Aides May NOT Provide

HCOs are prohibited from arranging for medical services and HCAs cannot provide any medical services to clients. There is no waiver or any other type of consent that removes this prohibition as medical services may only be administered and provided by an authorized medical professional or agency. The following list contains examples of services, but is not an all-inclusive list, that HCAs cannot provide:

- diabetic insulin shots
- tube feedings and care
- colostomy bag care

catheter care

IV insertions

vital signs

- bed sore treatment
- blood pressure

post-surgery wound care

- physical therapy
 glucose readings
- ventilator dependent care
- medication assistance*

glucose readings (blood sugar)

*HCAs may assist with medication that a client self-administers; however, HCAs are not authorized to assist with medication that requires administration or oversight by a licensed medical professional. For example, a HCA may remind clients to take their medication; however, they may not directly provide it to the client. A HCA may instruct clients to fill a pillbox per their physician's instructions but cannot fill the pillbox for them. There is no "medication waiver" that will allow the HCO or HCA legal authority to assist with or provide medication.
